

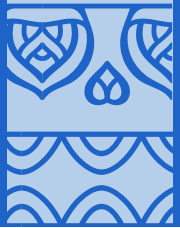

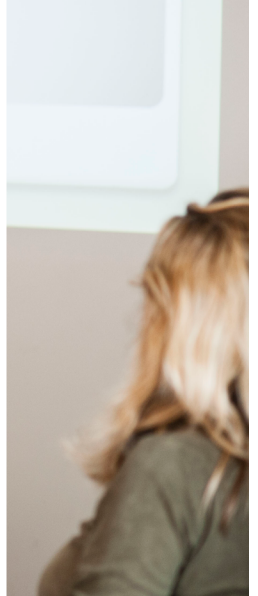

WELCOME TO SOUTH ASIAN LANGUAGES AND CULTURES

Ghent University offers a two-year master's program in South Asian Languages and Cultures ("Oriental Languages and Cultures – India"). The program draws on the expertise of the faculty and researchers from the "South Asia Network Ghent Research Group." From the academic year 2021–2022 onwards, the courses of the program's research-oriented track ("academic proficiency") are being offered completely in English and online, allowing students to obtain the degree from anywhere in the world. This research-oriented master focuses especially on the study of **Jainism and its languages**, preparing students for further studies in fields such as Religious Studies, History, Philosophy, Linguistics, and Literature, in addition to Indology or South Asian Studies. Furthermore, the program includes the possibility of spending a semester abroad at one of our partner institutes (in India or Europe through Erasmus).





WHY STUDY JAINISM?

Jainism is an ancient South Asian religious tradition that centers on the ideals of nonviolence and asceticism. Though the Jains have been a minority community throughout much of their existence, the mark they have left and continue to leave on South Asian history and culture is undeniable, and yet is often overlooked by scholars. With its distinct ideology of “non-absolutism” Jainism helped shape the complex landscape of Indian

philosophies and religions. In addition to Jain authors composing great literary masterpieces themselves, the Jains are known as important guardians of the literary heritage of India, commenting, copying, and preserving texts of all inclinations in their *bhandars*. Today, its austere tenets, including nonviolence, truthfulness, and non-possessiveness, have much to offer to contemporary global debates on ecology and business ethics.

Though Prakrit (in addition to Sanskrit and Hindi) has been on the curriculum since the 1950s, the study of Jainism at Ghent University was initiated in the 1970s by Jozef Deleu, who taught and published on the Jain canonical texts. He was succeeded in the 1990s by Frank Van Den Bossche, a specialist in Jain philosophy. Since 2010 Eva De Clercq has been continuing the tradition of Jain studies, editing, translating, and studying texts from the rich Jain literary heritage. From 2022, this tradition is further developed with the establishment of the Acharya Mahaprajna chair of Jain studies at Ghent University, generously sponsored by the global Jain community.

Central to our teaching and research philosophy is the conviction that, to become a true expert in any ideology, culture, etc., one must study that ideology or culture through its own language. The research of the “South Asia Network Ghent Research Group” is therefore firmly rooted in the use of primary sources. Hence, our

master’s program is centered around the languages of Jainism, including Prakrit, Apabhramsha, Sanskrit and (Old) Hindi.

Due to the historically close interaction of Jainism with Buddhism, students with a background of or interest in Indian Buddhism will also find this MA program worthwhile. The “South Asia Network Ghent Research Group” collaborates intensively with the “Ghent Centre for Buddhist Studies,” and our students benefit from the expertise of the Centre’s members. In addition to Jain studies, Ghent University also boasts a tradition of research and teaching in Historical and Comparative Linguistics. As a result, the classes on Prakrit, Apabhramsha, Sanskrit, and Hindi also form a solid basis for students interested in pursuing research in Linguistics. Moreover, as the little-studied literature of Prakrit, Apabhramsha, and older varieties of Hindi forms the basis of Hindi literature, our MA program is a good foundation for research on the history of Hindi literature.

ADMISSION

Direct admission to the master's program requires a bachelor's degree in Indology, South Asian Studies, Indian Studies, Hindi, Sanskrit, or equivalent: the student must be able to prove having passed academic courses in Sanskrit and/or Hindi, minimally up to intermediate level.

Alternatively, students who have a different bachelor's degree, may also qualify for admission through an *ad hoc* preparatory program. Students who already have a relevant master's degree may qualify to complete the program in one year.

Immediate admission is only for Belgian students holding the degree of Bachelor in Oriental Languages and Culture (India). Students holding a non-Belgian diploma, must follow an admission procedure: ugent.be/admission.

For students requiring a Belgian student visa, the deadline for completing admission is April 1st. For students who do not require such a visa – i.e. who wish to complete the program online from their home country – the deadline is June 1st. The required level of English proficiency is B2 of the European Reference Framework.
