Report on the Experience Gained by Dr. Hassan Kinyua Omari During a 5-Week Study of Jainism at the International Summer School of Jain Studies

Introduction

I, Dr. Hassan Kinyua Omari, a lecturer in Religious Studies at the University of Nairobi, participated in a 5-week intensive study program on Jainism at the International Summer School of Jain Studies (ISSJS). This report outlines the experience gained, key learnings, and significant places visited during the program.

I must admit that I nearly cancelled this trip, just thinking how I would live without meat. But I hereby state that this is the best way to go. I plan to continue being a vegetarian after seeing the benefits. No constipation, no stomach gas.

These sessions provided a comprehensive understanding of how these principles are integrated into the daily lives of Jains and their broader societal implications.

2. Field Visits to Significant Jain Institutions

We visited several important Jain institutions, gaining practical insights into Jain practices and their historical contexts.

Veerayatan: A center dedicated to culture, leisure, conference facilities, and spirituality, embodying the Jain principle of selfless hospitality service. We observed how Veerayatan integrates modern hospitality with spiritual teachings, promoting holistic development.

Abhay Prabhavana: It is a great wonder in the 21st century. Here we witnessed a great museum with Jain artifacts, and Jain history, connecting the past and future.

Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute: Known for its extensive collection of ancient Jain manuscripts and texts, the institute provided us with access to rare resources, deepening his research into Jain literature and history. Here we saw materials in several languages like Hindi, Arabic, English, Persian, and Brahmic among other languages.

Kolhapur Temples: Visiting these temples allowed us to experience ancient architectural grandeur and the spiritual ambiance of Jain worship places. He observed the rituals and interacted with devotees, gaining insights into the communal and religious life of Jains.

3. Interaction with Digambara Monks

We had the opportunity to meet and interact with Digambara monks, who practice an austere form of Jainism. These interactions were profoundly enlightening, offering a firsthand look at the monks' ascetic lifestyle, commitment to non-attachment, and deep spiritual discipline. The monks shared their experiences and perspectives on spiritual practices, further enriching our understanding of the Jain monastic life.
