

Preface

Dr. Shrikant Ganvir Coordinator Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology

Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology was established in the Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune in October 2023, and it is being funded by International School for Jain Studies (A Division of Amar Prerana Trust, Pune) and Vardhamana Charitable Foundation, USA. Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology has been set up at the Deccan College to promote researches in the fields of Jain Art, Architecture, Studies in Jain Heritage, Epigraphy and Archaeology, and to disseminate awareness about preservation of Jain heritage among heritage enthusiasts and commoners.

Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology undertook various academic activities such as Inter-Collegiate Quiz Competition on Jain Heritage, National Annual Research Seminar on Jain Art, Architecture and Archaeology, National Workshop on Jain Heritage, Prof. S. B. Deo Memorial Annual Lecture, Prof. H. D. Sankalia Monthly Online Lecture Series and Certificate Course in Jain Art and Archaeology.

The First National Seminar on Jain Art, Architecture and Archaeology and First National Workshop on Jain Heritage were well received by academic world. The participants from Maharashtra and other states such as Karnataka, Tamil Nadu, Himachal Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Delhi, West Bengal, to name a few, participated in the seminar and workshop.

50 participants including two international participants registered for the Certificate Course in Jain Art and Archaeology. A total number of 64 lectures were delivered by around 27 subject experts.

Besides these academic activities, an Internship Programme on Jain Art and Archaeology has also been commenced since November 2024 and they are working on preparing a bibliography of Jain Heritage, Art, Architecture, Epigraphy, History of Jainism and Archaeology of Jainism. One minor research project on Devagiri has successfully been completed by Oshin Bamb. Three research projects including one major and two minor research projects are being undertaken by the Coordinator, Assistant Professor and Research Assistant of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology.

In future, a workshop on Jain textual traditions, and a symposium on the History of Jainism in the Deccan are also being planned under the aegis of the Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology.

Certificate Course in Jain Art and Archaeology

The Certificate Course in Jain Art and Archaeology, being run by the Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune under the aegis of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology, is a novel initiative.

Studies in Jainism, especially pertaining to the art and archaeological perspectives have been taken up a little later compared to the study of archaeology of other religious traditions in India. Jainism has thrived in India since a long time and has left numerous traces of its existence, some being continued as sacred place of worship and some being reduced to unnoticed ruins. This course on Jain Art and Archaeology is in keeping with the recent approaches of studying the past, focusing on the processes dealing with the emergence, dissemination, changes and transformations in Jainism through historical and archaeological investigations.

The important features of this course are its focus on the history and chronology of Jain monuments, monasticism, Jain architecture, iconography of the Tirthankaras and Yaksha-Yakshis and other deities, important Jain inscriptions, role and nature of patronage and various other factors which led to the dissemination of Jainism in varied parts of the country. A field trip to an important Jain heritage site may be held.

The course will also examine the changes in different aspects of ancient society in the socio-economic and religious backdrop, which played a significant role in shaping Jainism in India.

Objectives of the course are:

- To offer an opportunity to students to understand the rich Jain literary and philosophical heritage of India's past and also in the present society.
- To introduce the students to the history of Jainism in India and Jain pilgrimage centres of India.
- To acquaint the students with a basic outline of history and archaeology of Jainism and its relationship to various sources of study.
- To study the art, archaeology and history of Jainism through analytical and contextual insights.
- To get acquainted with the various processes involved in the emergence and spread of Jainism in ancient and Medieval India.

• To give an idea of the various processes that have went on to impact the ancient and later day nature of Jainism.

On successful completion of the course, students should be able to understand the nature of various processes involved in the emergence and development of Jainism. The students will also get information to comprehend multiple aspects of the archaeology of religion in general, and Jainism in particular. The students will also be able to acquire knowledge of Jain art and architecture and Jain places of pilgrimage.

It is a 4-credit course and spans over 60 hours of lectures delivered by scholars on topics and regions of their expertise. The course received popularity from around the various states of India and even got international participants from countries such as China and USA. A total of 50 participants were given admission for this course, which was inaugurated at the hands of Prof. Pramod Pandey (Hon'ble Vice Chancellor) on 31st May 2024. The inaugural lecture of the course was delivered by Dr. Shugan Jain (President, International School for Jain Studies) on the topic 'Introduction to Principles of Jainism'.

The other eminent scholars who are delivering lectures for this certificate course include Prof. Ashok Kumar Singh (Former Professor, B. L. 

The course also includes internal assignments in the form of subjective and objective assessments, write-ups, abstracts, reviews, presentations, etc. A study tour will be organised at a Jain heritage site to give practical on-site experience to the participants of this course. Towards the end of the certificate course, a final examination would also be held. The students have given their positive feedback about the course and have considered it to be very useful.

A total of 64 lectures were delivered by the scholars. The course has reached completion on 5th December 2024.

Study Tour of the Certificate Course in Jain Art and Archaeology:

A study tour of the Certificate Course in Jain Art and Archaeology has been planned on 14th and 15th December 2024. These two days will be spent on giving on-site training to the participants of the course. The sites like Devagiri (Daulatabad) and Ellora, District Chhatrapati Sambhaji Nagar (formerly Aurangabad), Maharashtra would be studied and understood in their context of space and time. The iconography, art, painting, architecture and other aspects of the Jain tradition would be covered in this two-day study tour.

The First National Annual Research Seminar on Jain Art, Architecture and Archaeology

The Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune organised the First National Annual Research Seminar on Jain Art, Architecture and Archaeology under the aegis of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology on 31st August 2024. Around 16 research papers on various aspects of Jainism focusing on Art, Architecture, Iconography, Narratives, Recent Explorations and Textual Traditions were presented by scholars coming from different parts of the country. Around 150 participants came from Pune and other cities to attend the seminar.

Prof. Pramod Pandey, Honorable Vice-Chancellor of Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune chaired the inaugural function and explained about the activities being undertaken by the Chair for Jain Archaeology. Eminent art historian and the keynote speaker of the seminar, Prof. Kumud Kanitkar spoke on the Jain Architectural and Sculptural Remains in Maharashtra and expressed a strong need for undertaking studies related to Jain Art, Architecture, and Archaeology. She, during her lecture, encouraged young scholars to go deeper into every minute aspect for getting the best research outcome. Guest of Honour, Dr. Shrinetra Pandey, Director of the International School for Jain Studies (a division of Amar Prerana Trust, Pune), highlighted the importance of such academic activities and conveyed his wishes for the auspicious Paryushan Parv. Prof. P. D. Sabale gave the welcome address and highlighted the importance of micro-level studies in the field of religious history and archaeology. Dr. Shrikant Ganvir, Coordinator of the Seminar and of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology, gave the introductory speech.

Four technical sessions with broad academic themes were organised. The first session titled "Reinvestigating the Jain Art and Iconography" was chaired by Dr. Shubha Majumder, Superintending Archaeologist, Mumbai Circle, Archaeological Survey of India. Four research scholars presented their research papers in this session- Oshin Bamb presented on 'Created Narratives: Case study of Jain images from Khamtalav and Kumbhali, District Bhandara, Maharashtra'; Rahul Maurya presented on 'Visual Narratives and Sculptures of Jain Goddesses at Gandharvpuri (Dewas, Madhya Pradesh): An Iconographic Study'; Rutuja Hampe presented on 'A Study of Narrative Panels of Jabareśvara Temple, Phaltan, District Satara, Maharashtra'; Stuti Jain presented on 'Śāntinātha Basadi at Jinanāthapura: An Iconographic study'.

The second technical session titled "Exploring the Jain Temple Architecture" was chaired by Dr. Shrikant Pradhan, Visiting Faculty at Tilak Maharashtra Vidyapeeth, Pune, and four research scholars presented their papers- Abhishek Kumar, Anjali Verma and Jayatri Koushal presented a joint paper on 'Jainism in Outer Himalaya: A Case Study of Jain Temples of District Kangra'; Anchit Jain presented on 'Monastic Representations in Jain temple Architecture'; Deepti Kulkarni presented on 'Ādināth Basadi at Khidrapur, District Kolhapur, Maharashtra: An Architectural and Iconographic Study'; Nikita Singh presented on 'A Reappraisal of Some Forgotten Jaina Temple Sites of Purulia District, West Bengal: An Art and Archaeological Perspective'.

The third technical session was chaired by Dr. Shrikant Pradhan, which was titled "Recent Researches in Material Culture of Jainism". In this session, four researchers presented their papers- Prashant Goyal presented on 'Jain Remains at Idor Village: An Archaeological Exploration in Ashoknagar District, Madhya Pradesh'; Chaitanya Sathe and Aditya Gokhale presented a joint paper on 'Ghaṇṭākarṇa in Jainism: The Guardian Deity'; Yogesh Prabhudesai presented on 'Dynamics of co-existence between Jainism and Śaivism during early medieval period in the Kolhapur Śilāhāra presidency'; Shiwangi Singh presented on 'Reimagining Indian '*karni-bharni*' paintings from the Perspective of Jain Philosophy'.

The last session was titled "Interpreting the Jain Text and Narratives" and it was chaired by Dr. Rajashree Mohadikar, Former Faculty, Department of Sanskrit and Prakrit, Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. Four researchers presented their papers in this session on the corresponding theme of the session- Rupesh Madkar presented on 'Politics of Acquisition: Brahmartaisation of Jain Cultural Space'; Mihir Keshari presented on 'Understanding the rise of Jainism in Early-Medieval Western India: A socio-historical study of the text *Kuvalayamālā*'; Rohit Chakote presented on 'Legacy of Pethaḍa: Contributions to Jain Art, Architecture and Literature'; Vikas Saxena presented on 'Mythological and Cultural significance of Digambara Jain sites in Bundelkhand region of Madhya Pradesh'.

After every research paper presentation, an active questions and answers session was kept, which helped the audience to interact with scholars regarding their topics of interest. This brought in different perspectives and opened further scope regarding the topics.

Scholars and students of colleges and universities from states like Himachal Pradesh, West Bengal, Maharashtra, Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka, and Rajasthan participated in the seminar. The valedictory function was graced by Prof. Prasad Joshi, Honorable Pro-Vice-Chancellor of Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute. Prof. Ashok Kumar Singh, Former Professor at the B. L. Institute of Indology and Senior Research Associate at the International School for Jain Studies, spoke as the guest of honour, where he appreciated the efforts put in by the presenters for bringing original research to the floor. Prof. Shahida Ansari, Head, Department of AIHC and Archaeology, and convenor of the seminar, expressed her appreciation for the new generation's zeal for enquiring about the past. Gopal Joge presented the academic report of the seminar and highlighted the key outcomes of the research papers that were presented. Dr. Shrikant Ganvir presented a vote of thanks and applauded the efforts put in by the advisory, organising, and volunteering committees for the successful organisation of this seminar. An abstract book and a memento with an inscription from Pale Jain Cave were given to all participants as souvenirs. Oshin Bamb did the comparing for the programme. The Seminar was well received by the audience and was thus successful in disseminating knowledge on Jain Studies to the academicians as well as the commoners.

The First National Workshop on Jain Heritage: Jain Visual Art

The First National Workshop on Jain Heritage: Jain Visual Art was organised by the Department of AIHC and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune under the aegis of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology on 8th and 9th November 2024. It was conducted by Oshin Bamb, Assistant Professor of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology. The Inaugural Ceremony was graced by Prof. Prasad Joshi, Honorable Vice-Chancellor (A) of the University. Participants from varied age groups, cultural and professional backgrounds participated in the National Workshop- students, architects, scholars, travel enthusiasts, lay followers, etc. Various modules like the Introduction to Jain Rituals, Iconography, Art, Architecture, Paintings, etc. were taught. Each module was followed by an equally interesting discussion amongst the participants and a formal question and answer round between the participants and the speaker. Activities like quiz solving, sketching and painting a Tirthankara, describing a Jain image, understanding the perspective of an artist, of a lay follower and a researcher, etc. were also held during the two-day National Workshop. The participants expressed their gratitude and appreciation for their learnings in the two days of the workshop during the Valedictory Ceremony. Prof. H. D. Sankalia Monthly Lecture Series on Jain Heritage

It was thought that a Monthly Lecture Series for Jain Heritage should be started as an activity of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology, Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune which will be held in online mode so that many more enthusiasts from all over the globe who are interested in the domain of Jain Heritages should get benefitted. These lectures by respective scholars would surely enrich the students and other interested people with a detailed knowledge of varied subjects coming under the domain of Jain Studies.

Prof. H. D. Sankalia, the founder of the Department of Archaeology at Deccan College, played seminal role in establishing the early presence of Jainism in the Western Deccan through his articles. His numerous research publications, lectures and his academic career inspires many future researchers. To commemorate his contribution to academia and to carry forward his legacy, it was decided that this Monthly Lecture Series should be named after him and this would be known as 'Prof. H. D. Sankalia Monthly Lecture Series on Jain Heritage.'

These lectures would be organised in online mode on the last Wednesday of every month. The First Prof. H. D. Sankalia Monthly Lecture Series on Jain Heritage was held on 30th September 2024. The lecture was delivered by Oshin Bamb (Assistant Professor, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology) on the topic 'Serenity in Stone: Iconography, Architecture and Landscape at Muktagiri Siddha Kshetra'. Dr. Shrikant Ganvir (Coordinator, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology) gave the introduction of the activities of the Chair and also about the Monthly Lecture Series. The lecture was attended by hundred participants from around the world, including senior scholars, researchers, students, enthusiasts and laity. Jainism in Vidarbha, especially of the medieval period, has been through a lot of continuity and transformations, in terms of rituals, sacred space, monastic order, and even architecture. The landscape of the region was well explored and utilised to best suit the requirements for claiming the sacred nature for such tirthas. Muktagiri, an important tirthakshetra, mentioned in the lines of Nirvanakanda, grew on to become a very famous pilgrimage center not just for Vidarbha, but for Jains coming from all parts of the country. The landscape and scenic beauty were very well used to make the best place for religious and spiritual endeavors. The session was followed by interesting question and answer session. The doubts of the participants were solved with examples and relevant evidence.

Lecture 2 of this series was delivered by Dr. Yogesh Prabhudesai (Art Historian, Kolhapur) on the topic 'Review of Jainism in the Early Medieval Kolhapur' on 30th October 2024 where he spoke about art, architecture, inter-community dialogues, epigraphic sources for study of Jainism in Kolhapur and rituals of the then people. An interesting question-and-answer round followed his talk. Around seventy participants joined this lecture.

Lecture 3 of this series was delivered by Dr. Shubha Majumder (Superintending Archaeologist, Mumbai Circle, Archaeological Survey of India) on the topic 'Exploring 'Lost' Jain Temple Site and 'Stray' Sculptures of Chhotanagpur Plateau' on 27th November 2024. The lecture covered various lesser-known sites of the region of Chhotanagpur Plateau, where Jainism was a thriving religion in the past but the vestiges of Jainism lay scattered throughout the region. Approximately eighty participants had joined this online lecture. The audience got to understand the specific artistic style prevalent in the region with special reference to Jainism.

Prof. S. B. Deo Annual Memorial Lecture on Jain Studies

The Inaugural Prof. S. B. Deo Annual Memorial Lecture on Jain Studies as an activity of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology, Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune was organised on 1st October 2024 from 12 pm to 2 pm at the Prof. H. D. Sankalia Hall.

Prof. S. B. Deo's monumental work titled 'History of Jaina Monachism from Inscriptions and Literature' brought in a new impetus to Historical and Archaeological Studies related to Jainism. This work brought about a corroboration of the textual data of Jain literature and the inscriptional evidence from around the corners of the country. He was the Director of Deccan College from 1978 to 1985. His numerous research publications, lectures and his academic career inspire many future researchers. To commemorate his contribution to academia, especially to Jain Studies, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology thought of naming this annual lecture after him. The lecture was scheduled on 1st October 2024 on the occasion of the death Anniversary of Prof. S. B. Deo.

Dr. Shrikant Ganvir (Coordinator, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology) gave the introduction of the programme. Prof. Shahida Ansari (Head, Department of AIHC and Archaeology) delivered the welcome address. Prof. Pramod Pandey, Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor, Dr. A. P. Jamkhedkar (Hon'ble Speaker), Dr. G. B. Deglurkar (Hon'ble Guest of Honour), Prof. Shahida Ansari (Head, Department of AIHC and Archaeology), Dr. Shrikant Ganvir (Coordinator of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology) joined hands and offered flower garland to the photograph of late Prof. S. B. Deo.

The lecture on topic 'Haribhadrasurī: Contribution to Jain Yoga' was delivered by Dr. A. P. Jamkhedkar, Hon'ble Chancellor, Sir J. J. School of Art, Architecture and Design (Deemed to be University under De-Novo Category) and Former Chancellor, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune. After giving an idea of what Yoga really encompasses in Vedic, Post-Vedic, Jain and Buddhist contexts, he briefly explained how the scholarly works of Haribhadrasurī proved to be an important contribution in the field of Yoga and philosophy. The Guest of Honour, Dr. G. B. Deglurkar, Hon'ble former President, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune, shared his memories about Prof. S. B. Deo. He also expressed the importance of organisation of such lectures on Jain Studies and suggested that many more such lectures should be organised for the benefit of the interested people. Both these scholars Dr. Jamkhedkar and Dr. Deglurkar were the students of Prof. S. B. Deo, which is why the programme was very special for everyone. Prof. Pramod Pandey, Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor, gave the presidential speech where he highlighted the importance of commemorating great scholars and of passing down the legacy to the upcoming generations. Prof. K. Paddayya, Emeritus Professor, was also present at the occasion. The comparing was done by Oshin Bamb (Assistant Professor, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology) while the formal vote of thanks was proposed by Dhananjay Khandare (Research Assistant, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology).

The lecture was attended by around sixty people coming from around the city, including scholars, teachers, students, enthusiasts and others. After the official completion of the lecture, the audience engaged in an informal question and answer session and discussion session. This lecture was a true tribute to the memories and academic works of a scholar like Prof. S. B. Deo, whose contributions to Archaeology in general and Jain Studies in particular, have benefitted the academia a lot.





Research Projects of the Chair

Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology is keen on undertaking various research projects for spreading awareness about the vestiges of Jainism scattered across the country. The research projects would essentially focus on surveying, exploring, documenting, analysing the data, inference drawing and publishing the findings for the benefit of the academia and the commoners. Currently, one major research project and two minor research projects are in progress, while one minor research project has been completed. The brief details of these major and minor research projects are as follows:

Ongoing Major Research Project Archaeological Study of Jainism in Kolhapur and its Vicinity (c. 9th to 14th century CE) Name of the principal investigator: Dr. Shrikant Ganvir Names of coinvestigators: Oshin Bamb, Dhananjay Khandare

The Kolhapur district, located southwest of Maharashtra, has a rich history and culture of Jainism. The area became an important Jain centre from the 9th to the 12th century CE. During this period, Kolhapur was known as Kshullakapur. The place got the patronage of the Shilahara rulers and their ministers, which helped it to flourish as an important Jain centre. In his time several Jain temples were constructed, which were marvels of architecture of those times. These temples were prime worship places and served as a learning and cultural exchange centres for scholars, devotees and the monastic community from various regions. These Jain temples in Kolhapur are great examples of architectural heritage characterised by intricate carvings, iconography, and the use of locally sourced materials that reflect the craftsmanship and artistic excellence of the time. Most of these temples are still worshipped by the Jain community today and are of great interest to historians and archaeologists studying the region's rich cultural past. The legacy of the Shilahara dynasty's patronage, the community patronage and the region's significance as a centre of Jain religious and cultural activities is a testament to the history of Jainism in Kolhapur. This historical narrative not only enriches our understanding of Jainism's spread in Maharashtra but also highlights the architectural and cultural contributions of the Jain community in Kolhapur. An approximate number of twentyfour temples, sites with Jain remains, scattered archaeological material related to Jainism of this region would be surveyed and documented.

This study will explore the role of geography and other socio-economic factors in developing Jain religious centres and the network of satellite monastic centres in the vicinity of Kolhapur as a central site. This includes the documentation of Jain temples and their topographical and archaeological settings, as well as the documentation of habitational settlements wherever necessary, art and architecture and other archaeological remains at Kolhapur and its surrounding region pertaining to Jainism.

Documenting the archaeological remains of Jainism of Kolhapur and its vicinity is crucial for several reasons. Firstly, it helps preserve the rich historical and cultural heritage site, ensuring that future generations can appreciate and learn from these ancient structures. Detailed documentation, including architectural plans, inscriptions, and iconography, provides valuable data for researchers and historians, aiding the study of Jainism and medieval Indian history as a whole. Additionally, thorough documentation can assist in the conservation and restoration efforts, helping to protect these temples from natural decay and human-induced damage. By recording the current state of the temples, scholars can track changes over time and implement strategies to mitigate further deterioration. Lastly, such documentation raises awareness about the significance of the Jain archaeological remains, temples, images and others, potentially attracting more support for their preservation and promoting heritage awareness in the region.

The aims of this project:

- 1. To explore the development and formation of Jain temples in Kolhapur and its vicinity, identifying the elements that constitute their archaeological landscape.
- 2. To comprehensively document the landscape of Jain archaeological remains in Kolhapur and its vicinity, including detailed measurements of structural remains.
- 3. To analyse religious and architectural spaces within the regional landscape, linking them to a broader social context.
- 4. To investigate the influence of social, religious, political and economic factors on the formation of Jain sacred spaces in Kolhapur and its vicinity.
- To understand the continuity and transformations in Jain religious spaces in context of Kolhapur and its vicinity.

Historical records, inscriptions, and other primary sources will be examined to trace the history and development of archaeological records related to Jainism in Kolhapur and its vicinity. Published and unpublished data on early Jainism, Kolhapur Jain Temples, and surrounding archaeological sites will be reviewed and analysed. Archaeological, architectural,

and structural remains of temples will be documented (field notes, photography, measurements, and digital illustrations, ground plans and elevations), using advanced instruments. Highquality images and videos will be captured to create a visual record for future reference. Additionally, a comparative stylistic study of these art, architectural remains would be done, followed by their description and analysis. Inferences would be drawn thereon.

Completed Minor Research Project

A Forgotten Jain Religious Centre of Devagiri: Investigating Coexistence of the Two

Sects

(January 2024 to December 2024)

Name of the investigator: Oshin Bamb

Devagiri or Daulatabad, as it is known popularly today, is a famous destination for people having interest in medieval fort architecture, defence mechanism, fort layout and it overall caters to the minds of the academicians of medieval history as well as to the eyes of the commoner who visits the fort as a tourist. It is located at a distance of 17 km from the district headquarters of Chhatrapati Sambhajinagar (earlier Aurangabad). Although the fort is well known to have been the capital of Yādavas, due to which the dynasty is called the Yādavas or Seunas of Devagiri, the actual archaeological or architectural ramparts belonging to that period are now lost to the effects of time. During the Yādava period, it witnessed a prosperity in all regards, so much so that, getting attracted to this prosperous site, Allauddin Khilji's army came and took away enormous booty back with them, thereby humbling the Yādavas. During the same time, many temples were destroyed. The place rose to prominence of being the capital of the then Sultanate during Tughlaq rule for a brief period of time around 1328 CE. It was during the Tughlaq rule that the Jāmi Mosque was constructed from the architectural remnants of the temples. In the subsequent periods, the fort was added with multiple fortifications, defences, bastions, moats, gates and other elements for which it is known today and passed through the hands of Bahāmaņis, Nizāmshāhīs, Mughals, Marāthās and Asafjāhīs till 1948 when it was added to the dominion of the Republic of India.

Having been through multiple levels of occupation, Devagiri, literally meaning, the abode of Gods, in the initial period, was known as a religious centre for the Jain and Brahmanical folds. Based on the archaeological methodology implemented by the excavators at the site, where they calculated the number of beams, pillars and other elements now present at the mosque and other places, there were around twelve to fourteen temples situated around

water bodies such as kundas or wells. This religious nature of the place may have existed since the 10th-11th century CE, i.e., even before the shifting of Yādava capital here. Due to a strong identity as a religious centre for the aforementioned two faiths, Devagiri grew rapidly as a religious market town. With the coming of large number of pilgrims and the religious economy that bloomed due to them, prosperity grew in various aspects. Credits are also to be given to the strategic position which it enjoyed on the route connecting the Northern parts of India with the Deccan. In the year 1196 CE, it became the capital of the Yādavas during the reign of Bhillama V, who is also credited to have established the city as per Hemādri, the minister of Rāmacandra Yādava. After being recognized as the capital city, the earlier temples were repaired and new ones were built. During the 11th and the 12th centuries CE, many caves were also excavated around the hill. When these temples were destroyed during the raid by the army of Allauddin Khilji, the place may have lost its religious sanctity amongst the followers. Devagiri was known as *Quwwat-ul-Islam* or the centre of Islam, when the Jāmi Mosque was constructed. When the capital was shifted here from Delhi, it was renamed as Daulatabad, literally meaning the Abode of Prosperity. From being wrested by competing powers in later period, to being established as Bhārata Māta Temple after Independence, Devagiri has witnessed many transformations, not just in architecture or political suzerainty or grandeur but also in terms of its very nature and context.

The site of Devagiri (Daulatabad) is known as a famous medieval fort and that identity has got deeply embedded in the public perception. The nature of the site as a defence structure is popularly known but its pre-existing nature as a sacred site is yet to be re-established in the academia as well as in the public memory. While looking at the site through the context of its sacred and religious nature and the various changes that have happened, it is also important to minutely analyse the multi-valent religious nature of the site. When more than one religious and sectarian presence is attested at the site, distinct ritual spaces and practices may have existed. Addressing this sectarian co-existence (with respect to the two sects of Jainism) and re-establishing the identity of the present fort as a previously existing sacred space appears to be important and has not been dealt as such in previous researches.

Aims of the project:

1. To analyse the available textual and archaeological data at Devagiri to understand the religious and sacred nature (with special reference to Jainism) of the site.

- To delve in to study of the co-existence of the two Jain sects and the various dynamics that the site has evidenced in this regard through a thorough iconographical documentation of the archaeological record left behind.
- 3. To build a small history of the site of Devagiri with special reference to Jainism with the help of archaeological and historiographical corroboration.

With regards to the methodology implemented for this project, a review of some primary texts mentioning Devagiri has been done along with reading of the research works penned by various scholars with respect to the site of Devagiri or Daulatabad. A thorough documentation of the Jain images has been done and thereafter some corelation of the textual references with the archaeological materials has been attempted to bring out the importance of the site through the perspective of Jainism.

Ongoing Minor Research Projects Minor Research Project 1

Serenity in Stone: Unveiling the Sacred Architecture and Iconography of Jain Temples at Muktagiri

Name of the investigator: Oshin Bamb

Jainism in Vidarbha, especially of the medieval period, has been through a lot of continuity and transformations, in terms of rituals, sacred space, monastic order and even the architecture. The rise of pilgrimage centres, which the people of Vidarbha can fulfill their religious needs from, is yet another important feature. The landscape of the region was well explored and utilized to best suit the requirements for claiming the sacred nature for such tirthas. Muktagiri, an important *tīrthakşetra*, mentioned in the lines of *Nirvāṇakāṇḍa*, grew on to become a very famous pilgrimage centre not just for Vidarbha, but for Jains coming from all parts of the country. The landscape and scenic beauty were very well used to make the best place for religious and spiritual endeavors. This project would describe the unique partially rock-cut and partially structural cave-temples and fully structural temples at Muktagiri along with the iconographic study of the images present here. Such architectural activities at the site were still well-thought and planned before execution, and this has been further substantiated by the description and study of these religious edifices in this project by the present investigator.

The picturesque location of these group of hill-temples at Muktagiri, in the midst of a dense forest covering the Satpuda mountain ranges, inlaid by the flow of various pristine

waterfalls, streams and rivulets, was chosen by the Jain followers for the creation of *Bāvana Jinālaya* i.e., a group of 52 Jain temples. Variety of flora and fauna adorn the natural landscape of this place, which got more famous for its sacred and cultural importance amongst the followers of Jainism, especially in the medieval period.

The aims of the project:

- 1. To study the development of Muktagiri as a sacred pilgrimage centre for the Jains.
- 2. To study the iconography and architecture at the Jain temples of Muktagiri.
- 3. To do photographic and literary documentation of the archaeological material present at the site.
- 4. To document and understand the narratives, rituals and other beliefs associated with the site.
- 5. To make site plan and ground plan of selected temples from Muktagiri.

Primary and secondary sources would be referred to get an idea of the previous studies undertaken with respect to the site. Data collection would be done through a thorough documentation of the images, temples and other antiquities at the site. For a holistic understanding, site plan and ground plans of selected individual temples would also be made. The collected data would be analysed to draw inferences and conclusions.

Minor Research Project 2

An Archaeological Exploration and Documentation of Anjaneri Jain Temples and Caves Name of the investigator: Dhananjay Khandare

The Anjaneri Jain Temple Complex, located near Nashik in Maharashtra, India, is an important archaeological site from the 12th century CE. This complex is famous for its ancient Jain caves and temples, which showcase the area's rich cultural and spiritual heritage of Jainism. It features structural and intricately carved cave temples, demonstrating the architectural skill and religious commitment of that time.

From an archaeological viewpoint, the Anjaneri Jain Temple Complex provides valuable insights into the growth of Jainism in Maharashtra. The temples are embellished with finely carved sculptures of *Jinas*, *Yakṣiņī* Ambikā, and Cakreśvari, reflecting the artistic talent of the period. The site also indicates the support of Jainism by various dynasties, such as the Rāṣṭrakūṭas, Yādavas, and Śilāhāras, who played a role in building and maintaining these

sacred structures. The Anjaneri site is significant for its religious and cultural elements but also enhances the understanding of medieval Indian architecture and iconography of Jainism.

This study will explore the role of geography and other environmental factors in the development of Jain religious centres and, also the network of satellite monastic centres in the vicinity of Anjaneri as a central site. This includes the documentation of Jain temples and caves and their topographical and archaeological settings, and also the documentation of habitational settlements, art and architecture, irrigation works, and other archaeological remains at the Anjaneri archaeological site and its surrounding region.

The aims of the project:

- 1. To understand the development of Jain temples and caves at Anjaneri, how they form, and what elements form an archaeological landscape.
- 2. To document the entire landscape of Jain temples and caves at Anjaneri, it includes measurements of structural remains.
- 3. To study religious and other architectural spaces within a regional landscape of meaning and interaction to link them within a larger social context.
- 4. To examine the role of landscape and environment in the formation of Jain temples and caves at Anjaneri.
- 5. To conduct the catchment analysis of the Jain temples and caves at Anjaneri.

Examining historical records, inscriptions, and other primary sources to trace the temple's history and development; reading, reviewing, and analysing published and unpublished data on early Jainism, Anjaneri Jain Temples, Caves, and surrounding archaeological sites; documentation (field notes, photography, measurements, digital illustrations) of archaeological, architectural, and structural remains of the Anjaneri Temple complex and other temples and caves located in its vicinity would be done. The documentation will be carried out by using advanced instruments. High-quality images and videos of the temple would be taken to create a visual record for future reference. A comparative study of the architectural models and archaeological remains of adjoining regions with important Jain sites in the study area will be carried out to derive conclusive statements.

Internship Programme in Jain Art and Archaeology

Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology is inclined towards creating awareness and academic enthusiasm regarding Jain Heritage, Art, History and Archaeology. One of its aims is to provide a forum for post-graduate and research level training programmes, workshops, conferences, symposiums, seminars in the fields of Archaeology of Jainism, Jain Art and Architecture, etc. for generating interest about Jain Studies amongst the young scholars. Keeping this in mind, an internship programme is being organised to train students in the field of Jain Art and Archaeology and thereby develop a short-term project. The objectives of this internship programme are- to provide exposure and training to young students in the field of researches in Jain Studies; to impart experience in data collection, referencing, research writing; to develop a short-term project on a topic related to Jain Studies.

A total of two interns have been selected for this programme out of the fourteen applications that were received. The internship is being offered in offline mode and the location of workspace is Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune. It is a full-time internship with a duration of about 3 months. It has commenced from the month of November 2024 and will go on till the month of January 2025. The nature of work in this internship includes data collection, referencing, research writing, developing a short-term project and any other academic work associated with Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology. These interns would get training from Dr. Shrikant Ganvir (Coordinator of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology), Oshin Bamb (Assistant Professor, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology) and Dhananjay Khandare (Research Assistant, Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology).

The team of interns, under the guidance of aforementioned people, would work on bringing out a bibliographic compilation of all important academic writings related to Jain Art, Architecture, History and Archaeology. For this bibliographic work, the library of Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune, other important libraries in the city, online repositories, open access journals, research articles, papers, proceedings, excavation reports, dissertations, theses, books, monographs, edited volumes, online databases and other sources would be utilised. This extensive bibliography will be extremely useful to all researchers and students of Jain Studies where they will get references to almost all the data that they need at one place. The selected interns who are dedicatedly working for this project are Smriti Kushwaha and Deepti Kulkarni.

The interns would also submit a brief report towards the end of their internship about their learning experience. The attendance record and the details of work supervision would be maintained. A certificate regarding successful completion of the internship shall be issued at the end of the internship programme.

The First Inter-Collegiate Quiz Competition on Jain Art, Architecture, Heritage and History

The Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (Deemed to be University), Pune under the aegis of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology, organised the First Inter-Collegiate Quiz Competition on Jain Art, Architecture, Heritage and History to commemorate the 2623rd Janma Kalyāṇaka of Bhagwāna Mahāvīra and the World Heritage Week on 27th April, 2024 at Prof. S. M. Katre Hall (New Convocation Hall) Department of AIHC and Archaeology, Deccan College PGRI, Pune.

The quiz focused upon the themes of art, architecture, heritage and history pertaining to Jainism. It was in the form of 50 multiple-choice questions, which were to be solved in a time limit of an hour. The competition was open to all Junior College, Under-Graduate, Post-Graduate, PhD and any other students or even laypeople (up to age of 40 years) who are interested in the domain of Jain Studies. A total of 130 participants registered through the link for online registration. These participants were representing universities, colleges and institutes like Deccan College PGRI, Pune; Fergusson College, Pune; Garware College, Pune; Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati; S. A. Prashant Goyal joined as the Research Fellow of Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology on 23rd October 2024. He is working actively on his PhD topic 'Jain Temple Architecture and Sculpture with Special Reference to Chanderi and Its Vicinity: Early to 15th Century CE, Ashoknagar District, Madhya Pradesh.' He has been referring to books by eminent scholars which would provide insights into Jain heritage in northern Madhya Pradesh. He has also studied research publications, articles and books by scholars like Professor Peter Flügel, Navneet Kumar Jain, Dr. Yashwant Singh, etc. These have helped him understand Jain architecture and its cultural importance. Since his association with Bhagwan Shitalnath Chair for Jain Archaeology, he has participated in workshops and lectures organized by the Chair. He has also been helping with the Bibliography Project, where he is involved in data collection, referencing, and writing about Jain heritage.

The details of his research topic are as follows:

Jain Temple Architecture and Sculpture with special reference of Chanderi and its Vicinity: Early to 15th Century CE, Ashoknagar District, Madhya Pradesh

In Central India, early architecture from the Mauryan and Gupta periods can be seen at sites like Sanchi, Udayagiri, and Nachna-Kuthara. Jain temples in Madhya Pradesh started as simple structures during the Gupta period and later became more intricate, as seen at Khajuraho and Gyaraspur. Ashoknagar district, especially the Chanderi region, is rich in Jain heritage, with important sites like Budhi Chanderi, Tumen, Guril Pahad, Khandargiri, Thubon, and Kadwaya. These places have Jain temples, sculptures, and inscriptions, showing the region's cultural importance. The Chanderi Museum displays many Jain sculptures, with more preserved in its reserve collection. Despite this, not enough research has been done on these sites. Detailed study can help uncover the full history of Jain temples and their gradual development in the region. This research will also highlight Chanderi's significance as an important Jain center.

Important sites like Chanderi, Budhi Chanderi, Thubon, and Kadwaya lack systematic research on their architecture, art, and history. This gap makes it hard to understand the cultural and religious importance of Jainism in the area. The history of Jain temples and sculptures in the region remains incomplete. This research aims to study these monuments and uncover their architectural and artistic significance.

Aims and Objectives of the research are:

- 1. To establish the chronology and stylistic affiliations of the existing Jain monuments in the Chanderi block.
- 2. To analyse the plan and elevation of these Jain temples and compare them with known Jain sites.
- To explore the dynastic architectural styles reflected in the Jain temples of this region. To highlight Jain heritage sites in Ashoknagar district through village-level archaeological surveys.
- 4. To document the Jain heritage sites, artifacts, inscriptions, sculptures, and temples found during the surveys.
- 5. To study the origin and development of Jainism in the district and reveal its historical progression, including understanding sectarian influence.

This research will start with a review of previous studies and available materials, both published and unpublished. He will conduct archaeological surveys in villages, ancient sites, rock-cut caves, temples, and other areas to gather facts and data. Personal interviews with villagers will help collect local stories, legends, and information about ancient Jain sites, temples, and sculptures. Tools like toposheets, site descriptions, cameras, GPS, district maps, and other exploration equipment will be used during the surveys. Finally, the collected materials and information will be analysed to create a detailed and systematic history of Jain architecture and sculpture in the Ashoknagar district.
